### Riherd, May Attend National Conference

State President Ron Riherd and Executive Director, Nancy May enjoyed the view from the 14th floor conference room in Washington DC, where the National Retired Teacher Advocacy Conference was held October 21-24. We enjoyed the Capitol City and were given time to visit our State Legislators Wednesday afternoon.

The Advocacy Conference was attended by presidents or legislative chairs and executive directors across the country. There were 58 in attendance from 34 States.

Ron and I were able to meet with Senator Thune in his Capitol Office and we left a message of concern for lowering prescription drug costs, and pension protection among other things. He was very cordial but quite busy, so the meeting was brief. Representative Johnson was not available, but his Aide met with us and we stated our purpose for meeting. The entire Capitol area was very busy.

Our time at the conference was very informative regarding prescription drug costs, Federal and State Retirement Security issues; Support for Public Pensions; Elder Financial Exploitation and Recruiting Multicultural Leaders. We in South Dakota are very concerned with the first two items, but need to keep an eye on the state legislature regarding pension benefits.

We were able to visit with Al Campos, Director, NRTA: AARP's Educator Community, and he has agreed to speak at our annual Convention May 5th and 6th. He is looking forward to visiting South Dakota.

All in All, Fall Colors, Presenters, and Legislative Meetings were most enjoyable. It was nice to see retired school personnel from across the country and to reacquaint with those we have met at previous conferences. The conference was very informative and important to SD and its national representatives. Ron and I are pleased to have had the opportunity to represent South Dakota Retired School Personnel.

### 2020 Census and How You Can Impact Your Community

Census Day is April 1, 2020. In the US, census data are collected every 10 years. Then the data will be used to draw lines for legislative districts thus determining how millions of federal funds will be distributed to states, local budgets and programs.

But, here's what's new. The 2020 Census may be taken as paper-based data collection AND, in this digital age, the members of households may choose instead to respond to the census survey online, by phone, or by mail. The census questionnaires will be sent to all households by early 2020. AARP's census efforts will be to educate older adults about the importance of the census and to provide consumer tips to protect the senior community from bad actors intent on committing census-related fraud.

However you decide to complete the 2020 Census questionnaire, **just do it!** Any loss of data will impact your community for a decade.

May I be a census taker?

The 2020 Census provides a unique opportunity for 50+ Americans to supplement their income. The US Census Bureau has already begun to recruit an estimated 400,000 census workers to update addresses, answer phones, oversee field staff, and go door-to-door to help people fill out the census forms. The current salary pay listing for Lawrence County, SD is \$13.50 per hour and the work schedule is somewhat flexible. Additional information indicates that the census taker position will receive reimbursement for work-related mileage and expenses. Complete Count Committees are helping to ensure hard to count communities like Lower Brule are reached.

Job qualifications are: 18 years of age, have a valid Social Security number, be a US citizen, have a valid email address, complete the application, pass fingerprinting and background checks, complete the on-line training, and be available for flexible hours. Men, also, needed to have registered with the selective service system. Personally, the applicant must have access to a car and have access to a computer. For more information review 2020census.gov/jobs.

According to a 2011 follow-up report on the 2010 census, the US bureau received 3.9 million applications. Of those accepted, 2.8 million were deemed eligible for employment; 857,000 eventually were hired. The most common position for census employment was enumerators, those who go door-to-door, to collect paper-based information.

*Remember*: Don't miss taking the census; any loss will impact your community for a decade.


## BEWARE OF CENSUS SCAMS



April 1, 2020 is Census Day — the due date for Americans to take part in the decennial national headcount. Until then, and possibly beyond, you'll hear a lot about — and a lot from — the U.S. Census Bureau. But census activity isn't limited to years ending in 0, and neither is census fraud.

Census scammers contact you by phone, email, regular mail or home visit, or direct you to phony websites, seeking personal and financial information. They adopt the mantle of the U.S. Census Bureau to win your trust — with the added advantage of spoofing an agency that is tasked with asking questions.

Along with its once-a-decade population count, the actual U.S. Census Bureau conducts more than 130 surveys each year. The biggest, the American Community Survey (ACS), is sent yearly to more than 3.5 million homes to collect data that helps determine how billions of dollars in state and federal money is distributed. With its detailed questions about things like income, assets, job status, household amenities, even your commute, the ACS does set off scam suspicions — it's a frequent subject of calls to AARP's Fraud Watch Network Helpline — but it is legitimate, and relatively easy to verify (see tips on reverse).



#### **CENSUS SCAM WARNING SIGNS**

- You get an email claiming to be from the Census Bureau. For household surveys and the decennial Census, the agency almost always makes contact by mail.
- A supposed census agent asks you for money or financial data, such as your bank account number and balance.
   Census will never ask for this information.
- A supposed census taker threatens you with arrest. Taking part in the Census is required by law, and you can be fined for not doing so, but you can't be imprisoned.

No genuine census survey or agent will ask for your Social Security, credit card or bank account numbers. They won't ask when you leave for or return from work. They won't ask for money. They won't threaten jail time if you don't answer their questions. Any of these is a sure sign that a supposed census taker is looking for ways to steal your identity, money or possessions.

Census fraud can hit at home or at work (the Census Bureau conducts business-related surveys, too). Be especially watchful for impostors in early and mid-spring of 2020, when the actual Census Bureau will be sending out reminders to fill out your form and following up in person at households that don't respond.

#### TIPS TO SPOT CENSUS SCAMS

- 1) Verify that a census taker is legitimate. All should have a Census Bureau photo ID badge (with a Department of Commerce watermark and an expiration date) and a copy of the letter the Bureau sent you. You can also search for an agent's name in the Census Bureau's online staff directory.
- 2) Confirm that a questionnaire you've received is on the Census Bureau's official list of household or business surveys.
- 3) Contact the Bureau's National Processing Center or the regional office to verify the validity of an American Community Survey or other census communication.
- 4) Check that a census mailing has a return address of Jeffersonville, IN, the site of the National Processing Center. If it's from somewhere else, it's a scam.
- 5) Check the web address of any supposed Census website. Make sure it has census.gov in the address and look for https:// or a lock symbol in the browser window.
- 6) Don't give your Social Security number, mother's maiden name, or bank or credit card numbers to someone claiming to be from the Census Bureau. Genuine Census representatives will not ask for this information.
- 7) Don't reply, click links or open attachments in a suspicious census email.
- 8) Don't trust caller ID scammers can use "spoofing" tools to make it appear they are calling from a real Census Bureau number. Call the National Processing Center at 800-523-3205, 800-642-0469 or 800-877-8339 (TDD/TTY) to verify that a phone survey is legitimate.

To report a scam call, or for help if you've fallen victim, call the AARP Fraud Watch Network Helpline at 1-877-908-3360.




### Sioux Falls
